

We are fortunate to have found an outstanding incoming artistic director, Michael Morris. Mr. Morris has been teaching voice, conducting, and singing professionally for over 40 years. He has served on the music faculty at Holy Names College, Notre Dame de Namur University, Santa Clara Univer-

sity, Ohlone College, and De Anza College. Michael has sung the leading baritone roles in some 80 operas. He is a highly respected and engaged music director and conductor. We look forward to introducing you to him during our 2018-2019 season.

Michael received his Master of Music Degree in Vocal Performance from Notre Dame de Namur University and his Bachelor of Music Degree in Music Education from San Francisco State University. He studied opera at the American Institute of Music Studies in Graz, Austria, where he received the George London Award for Vocal Performance.

CONDUCTOR NOTES By Laurie Anne Hunter



The inspiration for the title of this concert, *Walking in Beauty* came from the Navajo blessing prayer known as *Now I walk in Beauty*. There are different versions of the text, but they all express the notion of beauty before, behind, above and below. To walk in beauty is to be in harmony with everything around us—recognizing the beauty and connectedness of everything we see, appreciating the wonder of the universe we live in, and feeling the profound sense that we belong and that our lives are precious.

I wanted my last concert as Artistic Director of the Rogue Valley Chorale to be special. Many of the songs I have chosen for this program seem to resonate with the phase of my life in which I find myself, hoping to slow down and recognize the healing, love and beauty that is around me. I believe this music offers inspiration, joy, and a deep appreciation of the many forms that beauty takes. We open with *The Voice*, a lively song made popular by the group Celtic Woman, that tells us there is a voice or spirit who knows us, and will guide us if we listen. Mark Reppert, who conducts the Siskiyou Singers and is also singing with the Chorale this season, wrote a musical setting of Now I Walk in Beauty that helps set the tone for the rest of the concert. Poems of peace and harmony provide the lyrics for several pieces, including James Agee's Sure On This Shining Night, set to music by Morten Lauridsen, Distinguished Professor of Composition at the University of Southern California Thornton School of Music, and She Walks in Beauty, one of Lord Byron's most famous poems, set by composer Kevin Memley from Fresno, California. Vermont composer Gwyneth Walker adapted the lyrics for The Tree of Peace from the poem O Brother Man by John Greenleaf Whittier (1807-1892), which exhorts us to "Listen to one another" so that "Love shall tread out the fire of anger, and in its ashes plant a tree of peace."

In preparing this program, I have also been mindful of the Chorale's upcoming trip to Ireland at the end of June. Most of our performances there will be in churches, and so it seemed appropriate to include a number of inspirational church anthems. *We are Not Alone* by Pepper Choplin speaks to many of us who have experienced loss. *For the Beauty of the Earth*, based on a famous hymn text, was written in 1980 by British composer John Rutter, one of the most prolific choral composers alive today. The Chorale has sung many of Rutter's compositions, including *Gloria*, which was featured on our Christmas concert this season. We close our first half with a beautiful setting of the famous hymn, *O Love*, which speaks of the immense power of love to reach us through our pain, giving us hope for a future that "shall richer, fuller be."

My tenure as Artistic Director of the Chorale has largely been about collaboration, so it seems fitting that my final concert should also include the Rogue Valley Youth Ensemble, who joins us for *Jubilate Deo* by Peter Anglea and the traditional Camp Meeting song, *No Time*, arranged by Susan Brumfield.

As I wrote in my last Chorale newsletter article, it is with immense love and gratitude that I leave the Chorale community. I feel a bit like I am stepping into the unknown of a new life. But I can truly say to you, "Because I knew you, I have been changed for good."

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ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

A native of Pasadena, California, Laurie Anne Hunter received her B.A. from the University of Winnipeg and her Masters in Piano Accompanying from the



Juilliard School in New York. She spent five seasons as an Assistant Conductor and Vocal Coach with the New York City Opera, becoming only the fourth woman ever to conduct there when she made her Lincoln Center debut with Marc Blitzstein's *Regina* in 1992. Guest conducting appearances followed with the New England Lyric Operetta, Skylight Opera Theatre in Milwaukee, and the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony.

She was Associate Conductor of *Phantom of the Opera* in Toronto and *Showboat* on Broadway, and Assistant Conductor and Vocal Coach for the Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, Augusta Opera, Mobile Opera, Boston Concert Opera, and the Metropolitan Opera Guild's educational productions. She headed the music staff for two years at the Banff Centre's Music Theater program in Canada, and worked with American Musical Theater of San Jose and the Seattle Opera. Ms. Hunter has been on the faculty of the Hartt School of Music in Hartford, Connecticut, the Israel Vocal Arts Institute in Tel Aviv, and the Musicians Club of America summer Opera and Lieder Institutes in North Carolina.

In 2001, the Oregon Shakespeare Festival brought her to Ashland as Musical Director and Pianist for *Enter the Guardsman*, and she has been an active and valuable part of the Rogue Valley's musical scene ever since. She has been an adjunct faculty member at Southern Oregon University since 2001, and music director at the First Presbyterian Church in Ashland since 2010. Additional contributions to the musical life of the Rogue Valley include work with the Oregon Cabaret Theatre, Southern Oregon University Theatre Productions, Southern Oregon Repertory Singers, Rogue Valley Symphony, Rogue Opera, and the Brava! Opera Theatre/James M. Collier Young Artist program. She took up the harp while earning her certification from the "Music for Healing and Transition Program" and for many years played therapeutic harp music for Providence Cancer Center and Hospice in Medford.

Ms. Hunter has been a part of the Rogue Valley Chorale community since 2002, serving as guest accompanist, Board member, and guest conductor before being appointed as the Chorale's Artistic Director and Conductor in 2013. She is delighted to have become more closely acquainted with this fine group of singers and to have gained so many new friends.

JIM COLLIER CONCERT SPONSOR IN PERPETUITY



What would our valley be like without Jim Collier? His dedication to supporting the arts is well known, and many music and theater groups owe their ability to serve our community to this outstanding individual.

An inheritance enabled Jim to become a generous patron of the performing arts. Jim



not only supports the arts in the Rogue Valley, but also sponsors orchestras and opera companies in his hometown of Des Moines, Iowa, as well as in Bakersfield, California. He was nominated as Outstanding Individual Philanthropist of Central Iowa in 2006, and is known as "The Piano Man," a title he earned by donating three concert grand and four upright pianos to various organizations in the Rogue Valley.

Jim was exposed to music as a young boy. He took piano lessons, but when it came time to showcase his talents during his first recital, Jim pretended to be sick. His savvy mother didn't buy it and made him perform. Jim reports that no one was sorry to see him give up the piano after his "less that perfect" performance. But his piano experience planted a seed that grew into an intense love of the arts. Jim says, "I am a much better patron of the arts than a performing artist. I'll leave that to others."

Jim retired to Medford after teaching high school English in Delano, California (near Bakersfield) for 30 years. A group of friends introduced him to the opera, and he made frequent trips to Los Angeles to see spectacular performances featuring some of the world's finest singers. Opera deepened his interest in the performing arts. He began visiting Ashland to attend the Oregon Shakespeare Festival plays, a passion he shared with his students in California.

The term "arts in Southern Oregon" has become synonymous with the name Jim Collier. Our community is richer because of this tireless and dedicated philan-thropist.



LISA TRUELOVE, cello

Lisa lives in Ashland, Oregon. She has a Bachelor of Music performance degree in cello from Ithaca College, NY. Lisa has performed with the Northwest Bach Ensemble, with Oregon Shakespeare Festival as both cellist and cast member, and plays regularly with the Southern Oregon Repertory Singers and Brava Opera. Lisa performs every summer with the Britt Classical Festival Orchestra in Jacksonville, Oregon, and often with the North State Symphony in Chico and Redding, California. She is currently Principal Cellist with the Rogue Valley Symphony. Lisa maintains a private cello studio in her home and performs cello/piano recitals with her husband Stephen.



LORI CALHOUN, alto recorder

Lori has played Principal Clarinet for the Rogue Valley Symphony since 1983, and performs regularly with Brava Opera. As a doubler, she has appeared with Bernadette Peters, Natalie Merchant, and Chris Botti. She has been an integral musicianwithlocalorganizationssuchastheOregonShakespeare Festival, Oregon Cabaret Theater, and Camelot Theater, and has appeared with Southern Oregon Repertory Singers, Siskiyou Singers and Rogue Valley Chorale on instruments including clarinet, bass clarinet, flute, alto and soprano saxophones, recorders, duduks and wind synthesizer. Lori specializes in clarinet pedagogy and coaches clarinet for the Youth Sympho-



ny of Southern Oregon, as well as teaching clarinet privately. She shares her singing talents with young people in classroom music instruction.

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ACCOMPANIST MIKIKO S. PETRUCELLI

Mikiko S. Petrucelli was born in Tokyo, Japan where she first started playing piano at the age of 4. She attended the Mushashino Academia Musicae and



received her undergraduate degree in Piano Performance. She then moved to Germany and earned a Performance Degree from the Hochschule für Musik in Detmold, Germany. After she returned to Japan, Mikiko played with the string chamber group Uovo as their guest pianist, touring Japan and giving chamber and solo concerts in Germany. She has played on NHK radio, the national public radio station in Japan, and won a special award at the Josef Dichter Competition in Vienna, Austria in 2001.

In 2004 Mikiko moved to the United States and received a Masters of Music from Baylor University and Doctor of Musical Arts in Piano Performance from the University of Nebraska, Lincoln.

In 2008, as a result of winning the Chiara Competition, Mikiko performed Dvorak's Piano Quintet with the Chiara Quartet. She has also studied Historical Performance Practice in fortepiano. In 2008, she was invited to an international conference, as a result of a complete Hixson-Lied Presentation of Scholarly and Creative Activity Grant. She attended an international conference "The Art of the Fortepiano" and performed in several concerts in Middleburg, the Netherlands.

Mikiko has extensive experience as a chamber and solo pianist as well as an accompanist. As of May 2010, she completed three years of service at Doane College in Crete, Nebraska as an adjunct faculty member. She joined the Rogue Valley Chorale as accompanist in 2015.



CONDUCTOR EMERITUS

Lynn Sjolund, Founding Artistic Director/Conductor Emeritus of the Rogue Valley Chorale, served as Artistic Director from 1973 until 2013. During his tenure, the Chorale presented hundreds of concerts to the community, toured Europe 7 times, performed at Carnegie Hall and made a lasting impact on the Rogue Valley community. The Rogue Valley Chorale singers will forever hold a place in their hearts for Conductor Emeritus Lynn Sjolund.

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
