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


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



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Motes from the Conductor



The two composers on the Chorale's program were about as different as two people can be.

Cole Porter was born June 6, 1891 and died October 15, 1964. Mr. Por-

ter grew up in a wealthy family in a small town in Indiana. His grandfather was reported to be the richest man in the state. A Yale graduate, he tried studying law at Harvard to please his grandfather, but the urge to compose took him away from that profession. He traveled widely and loved the life of high society. Not only was he a facile composer (he composed well over 800 songs), he also wrote the wonderful lyrics for his songs. The number of musicals he wrote total 39, with *Kiss Me, Kate* as the best known. It has been conjectured he might have been an even greater composer if it had not been so easy for him.

George Gershwin was born September 28, 1898 and died July 11, 1937. One of America's greatest musical talents, he was born to Russian immigrant parents on the lower east side of New York City. His family loved music and bought a piano so his brother Ira could take lessons. To his parents' surprise and Ira's relief, it was George who played it. Starting piano lessons at age 10, he showed exceptional talent. At age 13 he was introduced to Charles Hambitzer, who taught George conventional piano technique, introduced him to music of the European classical tradition, encouraged him to attend orchestral concerts, and was George's mentor until his death in 1918.

At fifteen, George left high school to work as a pianist and song-plugger for

musical publishers on New York City's Tin Pan Alley. He was soon writing songs. "Swanee" brought Gershwin his first real fame. He went to Paris for a short time to study and was noticed by Maurice Ravel, who was fascinated by his use of jazz rhythms. Ravel was always an idol for Gershwin and each man was influenced by the work of the other. While in Paris, Gershwin composed An American in Paris. Delving in both serious and popular music, in 1924 he introduced his Rhapsody in Blue with the Paul Whiteman orchestra. Gershwin wrote some sixteen musicals, with his brother Ira as lyricist most of the time. He also worked in Hollywood and it was there that the avant-garde composer Arnold Schoenberg described him as "a man who lives music, and expresses everything, serious or not, sound or superficial, by means of music, because it is his native language." Gershwin's masterpiece was his opera Porgy and Bess, which ran for 125 performances on Broadway.

In 1937, at the height of his career, George Gershwin collapsed while in Hollywood working on the score of *The Goldwyn Follies* and died of a brain tumor. He was not quite 39 years old.

LAURIE ANN HUNTER, ACCOMPANIST

A native of Pasadena, California, Laurie Anne Hunter received her B.A. from the University of Winnipeg and her Mas-

ters from the Juilliard School in New York.

The fourth woman ever to conduct the New York City Opera, she was also conductor, pianist and vocal coach for the Broadway company of *Showboat* and the Toronto company of *Phantom of the Opera* and worked with many regional opera companies throughout the U.S. and Canada before the Oregon Shakespeare Festival brought her to Ashland as Musical Director and pianist for *Enter the Guardsman* in 2001. Now on the adjunct voice faculty at

Southern Oregon University and a member of the Southern Oregon Repertory Singers, she has also served as Musical Director for the Oregon Cabaret Theater and SOU's Department of Theater Arts. She took up the harp while earning her certification from the "Music for Healing and Transition Program" and now plays therapeutic harp music for Providence Cancer Center and Hospice in Medford.

About the Chorale

Last year the Chorale opened the Craterian Ginger Rogers Theater's tenth anniversary celebration with two "standing room only" productions of 100 Years of Broadway. The next program, scheduled for January 19 and 20, has a similar theme as it presents music of two of America's most talented composers, George Gershwin and Cole Porter.

The Chorale has always enjoyed singing many kinds of music, acknowledging that both our patrons and our singers love variety. Audiences who heard and saw the recent production of Mendelssohn's Elijah are still raving about how effective and meaningful it was. The group has also presented the great masterpieces of choral music by Bach, Beethoven, Brahms, Handel, Mozart, Verdi, and others. In addition to five concert tours to Europe, most recently during July of 2006, the Chorale has appeared with the Britt Festival Orchestra and the Rogue Valley Symphony, and as a featured choir in New York's Carnegie Hall.

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR



Lynn Sjolund is well-known as a conductor and choral clinician. He has directed festival groups and adjudicated cho-

ruses around the country. His tenure with the Chorale began with its founding and has been continuous, with the exception of three years when he was Director of Choral Studies at Loyola University in New Orleans. He has been a regular conductor for Rogue Opera and has served as president of the Oregon Music Educators Association and the Northwest Music Educators Association.

Locally he worked on the renovation of the Craterian Ginger Rogers Theater and he currently serves on a committee for the Oregon Community Foundation. He has conducted the Chorale at New York's Carnegie Hall, and in March, 2002, he received the "Award of Merit for a lifetime of excellence in choral music" from the Northwest American Choral Directors Association. In October, 2002, the Arts Council of Southern Oregon presented Lynn with its "Lifetime Achievement Award."

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
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
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
