Several months ago Laura Rich, Rogue Valley Chorale grant writer, applied for a grant from the James F. and Marion L. Miller Foundation. In mid-December they were informed that the grant request for \$36,000 was accepted. It will be paid in yearly increments over a three year period starting April 2011.

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New Composition for the Chorale

These lyrics by Sara Teasdale are an example of what composer David Childs uses to transcribe notes into works of artistry.

David N. Childs was born in 1969 in Nelson, New Zealand. He has a bachelor's degree in composition and musicology from Canterbury University, Christchurch, New Zealand; a Master of Music degree in conducting from the Florida State University, Tallahassee; and a Doctorate of Musical Arts from Louisiana State University. He currently works for Highland Park



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From the Artistic Director



"The coming together and sharing of that which is beautiful cannot be left out of our lives."

What convoluted times these are. But what a privilege it is to be able to go to a rehearsal like the Chorale has each Monday night and forget aches and pains, what is happening to your retirement fund, and whether the country can come back together again. Just to sing. Just to concentrate on making a beautiful sound and coming together with others to produce a piece of beauty. Two hours away from the cares of the day are wonderful. And the tunes stay with you the rest of the week.

The Chorale has always been a mixture of real music lovers. Some are housewives, several are music teachers, some work in offices, some are professionals, some work with their hands. All have had positive musical experiences

in their background and many have studied voice and performed as soloists. All come together and musically sweat for two hours while they look for meaning in sound. They read the notes and rests and texts and look beyond the symbols to make the page come to life. Sometimes they struggle with pitch or dynamics or diction. All of it is done to put into sound what we think the composer wanted to say. Whether it is the profound music of Bach or the bouncy fun of Irving Berlin, the music is the thina.

It seems to me that it is essential that we have this kind of experience. All of us are responsible for finding our own joy. The joy can be in performance or as part of an audience. The coming

together and sharing of that which is beautiful cannot be left out of our lives. This is what the human experience is about at its best.

No one in the Chorale is paid for sharing their talents as chorus members. However, we do have expenses for music, publicity to let people know about our concerts. rehearsal hall rental. programs, and theater costs for rental and personnel. It has been our patrons for the last 37 years who have helped us with these expenses and on whom we rely. We consider you part of the Chorale family because we would exist in a much different way without you.

to facilitate and support the work of the Rogue Valley Chorale. As stated in the grant proposal there are five areas of development:

- . A viable and well-defined infrastructure that will enable the Chorale to function more efficiently
- 2. Adjust committee structure to enhance function
- A marketing plan with the goal of expanding the

- Chorale audience and generating an enhanced awareness of choral programming and increasing the public presence
- A long-range financial plan that includes less dependency on ticket sales and increased funding through grants, corporate and private
- Increased educational programming for youth

These goals were set in place by the Board of Directors September of 2009 during a Strategic Planning session where 3-5 year goals were set for their organization.

Jacque will be responsible for implementing the strategic plan, thereby helping to lay the foundation for the executive director position to be self sustaining at the conclusion of the three-year grant.

United Methodist Church in Texas conducting their enormous choir, but before then Dr. Childs served as Associate Professor of Chorale studies at the Blair School of Music, Vanderbilt University, Nashville.

He has received instruction from Dr. Kenneth Fulton, Dr. Andre Thomas, and additional instruction from Helmuth Rilling as a master class conductor at the Oregon Bach Festival.

His compositions frequently appear at state festivals and workshops, and at ACDA state, regional, and national conventions. He has received commissions from around the world, including Japan, New

Zealand, and South Africa. Currently he has over 70 choral works in print. All of this was accomplished by someone barely over 40 years of age.

The Chorale is thrilled to have commissioned Dr. Childs to compose a piece to be showcased in their final concert of this season. The piece entitled *To Musick* borrowed its text from a Robert Herrick poem by the same title.

Music, thou Queen of Music, care-charming-spell, that strik'st a stillness into hell: thou that tam'st tigers, and fierce storms that rise, with thy soul-melting lullabies, Fall down, down, down from

those thy chiming spheres, to calm our souls, as thou enchant'st our ears.

To Musick has been written with a cello obligato and we are honored to have Michal Palzewicz return as our featured soloist. In the past Michal performed with the Chorale thrilling the audience with his masterful and moving gamba obligato from the St.

Matthew Passion.

The Chorale is pleased to present the world premier of *To Musick* and other works of Dr. David N. Childs during their final concert of the season.
