LYNN SJOLUND, Chorale conductor, is well-known as a conductor and clinician for choral groups. This season he will be directing at Oregon State University, and in New Orleans and Mexico. In April of 1992 he directed the All-Northwest Men's Choir as part of the American Choral Directors conference. Mr. Sjolund also has directed opera productions for the Rogue Opera and is currently director of the company's programs for youth. After retiring from the Medford Public Schools, Mr. Sjolund spent three years as director of choral activities at Loyola University of the South in New Orleans. In February of 1992 he was awarded the Outstanding Music Educator award from the National Federation of High School Associations. The award recognizes his contributions to the quality of performance in high school music programs.

LINDA BORECKI, Chorale accompanist, was featured in the Chorale's November series as an organist. She is a graduate of Concordia College, Portland, where she majored in church music and studied organ with Nancy LeRoi-Nichol. In 1982 she completed a degree in organ literature under the tutelage of Jorg-Neithardt Keller at the Westfalen Church Music School in Herford, West Germany. Ms. Borecki served at Trinity Lutheran Church, Vancouver, Washington, and University Congregational Church in Seattle, before moving to the Rogue Valley with her family in 1988.

THE BARDS BRASS The Bards Brass Quintet was founded in 1985 with four of the present members. In 1991, Susan Foster was asked to join the group as trombone and euphonium player. Steve Thickett plays trumpet and fluegel horn; Mr. Hudson, trumpets; Mr. Knox, tubas; and Ms. Henderson, French horns.

The name for the group comes from their association with Ashland, which they consider their home base. The group performs for weddings, "Concerts in the Park," chamber music concerts and special events. A variety of instruments are used during concerts to better achieve the sound intended by the composers. Music composed for brass instruments is often associated with singing because of the sound of the instruments and the methods employed in making sound. The Bards Brass are noted for their full sound and the variety included in their performances. Mike Knox serves as Manager for the ensemble.

MEMBERS OF THE BARDS BRASS QUINTET

Larry Hudson, trumpets, is Director of Bands at Hedrick Junior High School. He graduated from Southern Oregon State College with a degree in Music Education, and took his Master of Trumpet Performance and Literature degree from the University of Oregon. He is the Principal Trumpet with the Rogue Valley Symphony and has also played with the Britt Festival and Cascade Music Festival orchestras.



Steve Thickett has held the position of Director of Bands at North Medford High School for the past two years. He received his degree in Music Education from Southern Oregon State College, and took his Master of Music Education degree from Lewis and Clark College in Portland. Steve plays trumpets, cornets, and the fluegel horn, which is a mellower sounding counterpart of the trumpet. He is Second Trumpeter with the Rogue Valley Symphony, has played with the Rogue Music Theatre, and is also an accomplished jazz trumpeter.

Terrie Henderson, French horns, has lived in the Rogue Valley since the mid-1970's, after moving here from San Diego. She attended San Diego State University on a music scholarship. She has played Principal Horn with the Rogue Valley Symphony since 1980, plays with the Rogue Music Theatre, and is Band Instructor at New Hope Christian School.

Susan Foster majored in Music Education at the University of Southern California and completed a Masters of Music Education at the University of Oregon in 1990. She is now on the faculty of Ashland High School as Director of Bands and is

a member of the Rogue Valley Symphony. She joined the Bards Brass Quintet, playing trombones and euphonium, in 1991.

Mike Knox was born in the Rogue Valley and has played tuba for 34 years. He has occupied the chair of Principle Tuba with the Rogue Valley Symphony twice, from 1968-1972 and again from 1975 to the present.
