Expanded Rogue Valley Chorale performs carols

It was a special evening. Lynn Sjolund returned as musical director and conductor of the Rogue Valley Chorale after a threeyear sabbatical in New Orleans.

The newly invigorated and expanded Chorale, more than 70 voices strong, offered a beautiful program of 23 Christmas

Sjolund and the Chorale made full use of the large church. An organist played in the

balcony at times. Singers stood along the sides of the sanctuary as well as the front for several selections.

The carols were primarily English, or English language, by composers ranging from Samuel Scheidt (1587-1654) to the contemporary Malcolm Williamson (1931) and William Mathias (1934).

A few were familiar, like "Away in a Manger" and "O Little Town of Bethlehem," but most were new experiences for many in the audience.

The evening offered many highlights:

- Susan Olson's beautiful solo in "Away in a Manger."
- The stirring Irish traditional "Wexford Carol" with Eric Smith as soloist.
- The two Mathias carols, the rousing

"Sir Christemas" and the dynamic "A Babe is Born."

- · Voices from both front and rear as several of the Chorale singers took to the balcony to lend extra dimension to Scheidt's "A Child Is Born in Bethlehem."
- hanced "Sans Day Carol" and "Shepherd's Pipe Carol." Sjolund added his own special touches with periodic commentary on the program

and the performers The program opened with "Sussex Carol,' arranged by David Willcocks, and "See Amid the Winter's Snow" by John Goss (1800-1880).

The Chorale sang two versions of "In the Bleak Mid-Winter," by Gustav Holst (1874-1934) and Harold Darke (1888-1976).

"Birthday Carol," another Willcocks arrangement, and "Lord of the Dance," a Shaker tune, concluded the evening. Time passed quickly.
