Program Notes



The music for today's program honors women composers. For most of the history of music, male composers have dominated the field. However, there are many women writing fine music today, and composers from earlier eras are being rediscovered. It is our intent to introduce you to some of America's best and most famous women. Their contributions have been noted by leading music organizations around the country. Using contemporary harmonic, rhythmic and melodic ideas they offer us fresh insights into the season.

Ringeltänze

<u>Libby Larsen</u> is one of the most active and successful composers working today. She has produced a substantial body of important works for orchestra, dance, opera, chorus, chamber and solo performance. Her <u>Sonnets from the Portuguese</u> is featured on the 1994 Grammy Awardwinning CD, *The Art of Arlene Auger*.

Ms. Larsen is an articulate and influential advocate for the arts. She is an advisor to many musical organizations, including the National Endowment for the Arts, ASCAP, and the American Symphony League. She has served as composer-in-residence with the Minnesota Orchestra and the Charlotte Symphony.

She has written about the Ringeltänze: "'A la creche' was the cry of the peasants and townspeople in the 16th-century France as they prepared to celebrate Christmas. Feasts and merriment surrounded Christmas Day then as now. The young people celebrated with dancing. At first, popular tunes were piped for the dances. Over the years, the words of popular tunes were replaced with the more sacred words which told the story of Christmas, creating new carols with old folk tunes. At the Christmas feasts, the new carols were used for ring dancing.

Carols II through VI were composed for the Grand Rapids Area Community Chorus of northern Minnesota in 1983. The first carol, completing the set, was composed in 1985. I made translations of the French texts, with the exception of the 'le petit nouveau né'. That phrase, loosely translated as 'the newborn', seemed too musical with which to tamper."

Alfred Burt Carols

The Burt carols have become an American tradition for many people. Their delightful, simple melodies and beautiful poetry speak easily to our times. The carols are the result of a tradition begun by the Reverend

Bates G. Burt, his composer son, Alfred, and friend-of-the-family Wihla Hutson. For many years these three collaborated on the creation of original carols, which were sent to friends as Christmas cards. Contrasts in tempi and moods make for easy listening and quiet contemplation.

A Feast for Christmas

Emma Lou Diemer is another outstanding American woman composer. Born in Kansas City, Mo., she attended Yale University where she earned her BM and MM degrees in composition. There she studied with Richard Donovan, Paul Hindemith and William Gant. Her Ph. D. was earned at Eastman School of Music where she studied with Bernard Rogers, Howard Hanson and David Craighead. Her list of awards extends from student days at Yale to 1995 when she was given the Composer of the Year award by the American Guild of Organists and the Mu Phi Epsilon Awrd of Merit.

Ms. Diemer has a long list of published compositions in many genre and has been commissioned to write for many symphonies, choral organizations, chamber ensembles and organists. She taught at the University of Maryland before moving to the University of California, Santa Barbara where she is Professor Emeritus. She is the resident organist at First Presbyterian Church, Santa Barbara.

About the music: *The Christmas Tree* has an underlying current of excitement with its rhythmic repeated notes, the voices answering each other. The contrasting middle section recalls Christ's birth and the closing returns to quiet anticipation.

"Blow, blow, thou winter wind" is a line from As You Like It that comments metaphorically on human relationships. The setting uses word painting, with unpitched sounds to imitate the wind as it blows coldly and ominously.

The ringing of bells can be heard in *On Christmas Eve* in a piece full of tone painting. The open church-like sounds of Mass are contrasted with the lurching motive of drinking and the roaring up of the fire.

Sweet dreams, form a shade from Blake's Songs of Innocence is a bitter-sweet lullaby by a mother who compares her sleeping child to the Christ Child who "smiles on thee, on me, on all," but who "wept for me, for thee, for all."

Make we joy now in this feast is a celebratory, vigorous conclusion. Its rhythmic intensity and many meter changes carry the listener quickly through Latin phrases that mingle with the English and from which the English grows. By switching easily from Latin to English, Diemer has emphasized the universality of the joyous event.

<u>Salli Terri</u> was an arranger and singer for the Roger Wagner Chorale. Her many compositions using folk songs are complex and appealing. In *Sing We Now of Christmas* she moves the melody from part to part to enhance the robust nature of the carol.

<u>Elizabeth Poston</u> was born in Hertfordshire, England. She studied at the Royal Academy of Music and worked on the BBC music staff. Her compositions include songs and incidental scores for radio. She also edited various anthologies of songs and carols. *Jesus Christ the Apple Tree* uses a text by the New Hampshsire poet, Joshua Smith.

Lynn Sjolund has been the music director/conductor of the Rogue Valley Chorale for twenty-one of its twenty-four years. His leadership has included many large works by Bach, Brahms, Mozart, Haydn, Mendelssohn, Handel, Britten and others. In addition the group has performed works ranging from the Renaissance to contemporary periods. Mr. Sjolund has music degrees from the University of Oregon and also studied in Germany. Before retiring he was director of choral ac-

tivities at Medford Senior High School. Since that time he has filled similar positions at Loyola University in New Orleans and at the University of Oregon. He also has been the regular conductor for Rogue Opera and a regular clinician and adjudicator for contests and choral workshops.

<u>Jodi O'Connell Ware</u> is relatively new to the valley and her talents are much in demand. A pianist, flutist and singer, she has worked for the Rogue Opera in all three capacaties. She regularly accompanies many soloists and groups. . She continues to study piano and presently is a student of Mark Wescott of Portland. Ms. Ware came to Medford from Minnesota where she was active in musical productions. In addition to her own playing she has a studio for piano and flute students. She is married to Mark Ware, owner of the Ware House of Pianos.
