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



Have you ever thought seriously about how much American music there is? Try to come up with a program that represents different eras in our somewhat brief history and you will experience some of the frustration of picking just a few representative pieces.

We have tried to give samplings of music from many different eras, but trying to include everything would mean a pageant of interminable length. So, we have hit the high and low spots, but you will have to fill in the gaps.

Some will complain about the inclusion of the Beatles' songs, but they are such a major

part of what happened during the sixties they couldn't be left out. Both they and their music went through the rapid changes of the times. If you look at their early pieces like "I Want to Hold Your Hand" or "Help" and then listen to pieces like "Eleanor Rigby" or "Norwegian Wood", you hear a growth of quality and ideas that is remarkable. The pieces we chose are from the thoughtful, mature period. Some of the melodies have been compared to the beauty of Schubert or Schumann.

"Workin' for the Dawn of Peace" has always been a favorite of mine because of the poignant story of the 'two brothers on their way, one wore blue and one wore grey...all on a beautiful mornin'. The two songs in the medley tell the yearning for peace and the workin' that the war might cease. It was adapted by Oregon composer, Ron Jeffers. Ron is an outstanding choral conductor, musician and musicologist who lives in Corvallis.

Another favorite of mine is the text, attributed to Chief Seattle and really written for a movie, which tells us very simply about the connectedness of man and our environment. "This We Know" uses an English text, but the composer, again Ron Jeffers, has suggested that it be sung in many languages at the same time.

A little bit about "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" seems appropriate. This song, one we all know and so many of us could sing along with, was arranged by Roy Ringwald. Mr. Ringwald was an arranger for Fred Waring, who had a Glee Club



that performed on radio once a week. Waring even preceded Ed Sullivan! Mr. Ringwald arranged many songs for the Pennsylvanians, and in the early 1940's he set Julia Ward Howe's poem to the well-known music. On June 22, 1943, Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians sang the arrangement on the regular broadcast. Waring was inundated with calls about the piece and it was published. By 1962 over 1 million copies had been sold. It is still available and selling about 10,000 copies each year! There are arrangements for men's voices, women's voices and also for two parts or three parts. It is an arrangement any composer would like to have in their portfolio—along with the royalties in the bank.

### **Andrea Brock, Pianist and Accompanist**

Andrea Brock, Chorale pianist, has worked with the group for ten years. Ms. Brock is Director of Choral Activities at South Medford High School and has developed a tradition of fine performing groups that have consistently been contestants in the Oregon State Choral Contest. She also has directed the music for musicals at South High and accompanied many of her students in district and state competitions.

Ms. Brock has accompanied many local artists in recitals and is active as a church organist. She and her sister, Hilary Hall, perform regularly in duo-piano recitals and were last heard in a performance at Umpqua Community College in Roseburg.

Andrea's degrees are from the University of Oregon, where she majored in music education, and from the University of Colorado where her degree is in accompanying. In addition she has attended special workshops including one in Leon, France.

Mrs. Brock's husband, Andrew, is also a music educator and regular tenor soloist in the valley. Her three children, Keenan, Molly and Will, fill all the hours she is not busy teaching and accompanying.

Mr. Sjolund often says Andrea is the best accompanist/pianist he has ever worked with, and her innate musicianship and fine technical proficiency make her indispensable to the Chorale.



As part of the Chorale program for our March concerts a survey of the value of music for children was printed. The results of the project underwritten by the National Endowment for the Arts and Chorus America were extremely supportive of participation in music. It found students in music to be more creative, have a better sense of self-esteem, have better memories and many other positive qualities.

This is the time of year when decisions about what happens in our schools for next year take place. I hope many of you will take it upon yourselves to call or write the administrators of your school district and remind them music is not a frill with vague positive results for children's learning, but rather a strong means of improving education in many ways.


Our valley is full of fine opportunities for both adults and students who can afford the Arts; however there are many children who will never reach their musical potential or know the joy of singing or playing an instrument if they do not have a significant opportunity to learn at school. Having been a music educator for sixty years I have seen what music can do for children. I weep for many children today who are being deprived of the quality of music education available fifty years ago. We have several fine teachers who are working very hard. I know they have impossible schedules and huge class loads making learning a very limited experience. Example: some elementary music teachers have contact with almost 1000 students every week, and each student has only one music class a week.

The Chorale has been the umbrella organization for the Rogue Valley Youth Choruses. The four choruses and their instructors do wonderful work in their weekly rehearsals; however, fewer and fewer children are applying for the choruses. The teachers attribute this to the fact there is so little time spent on music in classrooms. Also, there are no choruses in most elementary schools. Ultimately we all will lose if we continue to limit the role of music in our schools to grossly inadequate programs.

The Roque Valley Chorale, founded in 1973, is Southern Oregon's oldest public choral organization. Since its inception the group continues to grow musically as well as numerically, with a current roster of more than 90 singers.

Many of the world's great masterpieces have been sung for Southern Oregon audiences, including all of Bach's major large works, Mendelssohn's Elijah, and Requiems by Brahms, Mozart, Faure, Bach, Verdi & Durufle. In addition the Chorale has performed Handel's Messiah several times and also his outstanding oratorios Judas Maccabeaus and Israel in Egypt.



The Chorale has traveled to Europe on five concert tours, most recently in 2006, representing Oregon at the world renowned Mozart Festival in Salzburg, Austria, on the occasion of 250th anniversary of Mozart's birth.



In March, 2000, the Chorale performed as a featured group in a concert at New York's Carnegie Hall.

The group is always looking for capable singers. Those interested should contact the conductor or one of the Chorale members.



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


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# How will he know he likes it better than video games if he never plays one?
